What You Can Learn

The diploma program prepares the student for licensure and entry-level employment as a practical nurse. Students perform as a member of a healthcare team and function under the supervision of an advanced practice registered nurse, registered nurse, licensed physician, licensed dentist, or other practitioner authorized by law to supervise LPN practice. The program includes classroom, laboratory, and patient care learning experiences in a clinical setting.

At the completion of the program, the student will:

- 1. Function within the role of the practical nurse in the delivery of care to patients and families.
- 2. Communicate with patients, families, and members of the health care team.
- 3. Use critical thinking to safely perform requisite cognitive, psychomotor, and affective nursing skills.
- 4. Integrate ethical, professional, legal responsibility, and accountability into actions and decisions.
- 5. Assume responsibility for personal and professional growth.
