

Famous Food Writer Visits Culinary Institute of Virginia

At the Culinary Institute of Virginia (CIV), you never know who will walk through the doors next. The school has certainly entertained many a famous chef. However, this fall, famed food journalist Michael Ruhlman honored students and faculty alike with his presence.

A former culinary student and writer who has chronicled the careers of some very famous chefs, Ruhlman served up some solid advice to CIV's talented students:

• **Show Up** – Attendance is top priority. No matter how bad the weather is, how tired you feel, or how unprepared you are for class, the best thing you can do in culinary school is show up to demonstrate your commitment and dedication. "It doesn't matter how we clear a consommé or make a béchamel, what matters most is that we are there."

• Work with What You've Got – As a journalist, Ruhlman does not believe in writer's block. As a student at the Culinary Institute of America, he learned that chefs, regardless of circumstances, must be prepared to serve on time no matter what. He says it's amazing what you can accomplish when you have no other choice. "You make it work with the ingredients, the knowledge and the time that you have."

• **Cooking is About Life** – Sharing the wisdom passed along to him by Thomas Keller, executive chef and owner of the French Laundry, he says that culinary is a very gracious industry and cooking is all about life. "It's about the life of the animal that died, the farmer that raised it and the cook that prepared it. Chefs and cooks should honor those lives that contributed to the meal they are preparing."

After answering a few questions from chefs and students, Ruhlman stayed to autograph copies of his new book, *Ruhlman's Twenty*. Before departing, he offered up one last piece of advice: "All the little details are where it all begins. When you're a cook, try to act like the chef and that's what you will become one day."



Students Go Hands on at North Carolina Corning Plant

Greensboro students taking ECPI's Optical Fiber Communications class recently toured the Corning Plant in Winston-Salem, North Carolina, one of the world's leading manufacturers of single mode optical fibers. They started out in the color coating department, where they were able to observe spools of fiber entering a coloring machine that uses ultra violet light to bake the color into the glass fiber.

Then it was on to the buffering department, where a spool feeder pushes fiber bundles through a series of guiding pulleys that funnel them into a hot liquid buffer composed of two chemicals. From there, they proceeded to the cooling tank where the material is transformed into a hard plastic. As the fiber leaves the tank, there are a series of instruments that take measurements to ensure the correct diameter.

Students then learned about the strength member process. The strength member of a cable takes all of the stress when being installed to ensure that the fiber doesn't break or fracture. Country or customer specifications determine which strength member is used. Australia, for instance, uses a coated Kevlar strength member to deter termites from biting through the cables. The group then studied the jacketing process – the jacket on the buffered optical fiber is what protects the fiber from weather and animal damage.

Last stop: the final testing department, where each reel of finished fiber cable is examined with an OTDR (Optical Time Domain Reflectometer) to test the fiber for breaks and fault tolerance.

All in all, a great experience, but a very common one. "At ECPI University, we always talk about the many opportunities for hands-on instruction," says Greensboro Campus President Tammie Land. "This type of learning shows why our students emerge from ECPI so very well-prepared. Plus, it highlights the strong business and manufacturing partnerships that are so important to our success."

VMA and ECPI University Launch Statewide Manufacturing Technology Initiative

Program Designed to Close Skills Gap, Boost Economic Development

Once again, ECPI University has proven its worth as a strong business partner and catalyst for economic development. The Virginia Manufacturers Association (VMA) has announced it has chosen ECPI as its exclusive academic partner to increase accessibility to advanced technology industry training and credentials. ECPI will serve as the premiere provider of the association's industry-endorsed manufacturing technology (MT) training to prepare individuals for employment in critical occupations and to pursue further academic credentials. Initial offerings will include the Level 1 Manufacturing Technician and Manufacturing Specialist programs. This partnership will elevate the level of technical expertise in the Commonwealth, leading to greater employment opportunities in the growing manufacturing technology profession.



In 2010, VMA and ECPI partnered to establish certified assessment centers for the Virginia Council on Advanced Technology Skills' (VCATS) at all six Virginia campus locations. With the opportunity to provide VCATSendorsed Manufacturing Technology curriculum, ECPI is uniquely positioned to assist Virginia's workforce through targeted instruction designed to close skill gaps and provide key credentials sought by the world's leading manufacturers.

"Our industry research consistently shows there is a middle skills gap for qualified workers to meet our current and projected employment needs in Virginia. We are pleased ECPI has accepted this opportunity to lead the state, and ultimately the nation, in positioning education as an engine for industry retention and expansion."

workers within Virginia", said ECPI Virginia Beach Campus President Kevin Paveglio. "The academic initiative is going to lead to a 'real-world' outcome that will improve expansion for manufacturing in Virginia. Providing employment-relevant education is what ECPI has been doing for more than 45 years, so this is a natural fit for us."

ECPI will adopt VMA's workforce development model which includes providing onsite customized MT training to employers in addition to courses offered at each campus. This blended approach is a proven strategy to retain the existing workforce while recruiting qualified individuals who are interested in advanced technology, engineering and mechatronics.

Based upon the Skilled Trades Gap Analysis commissioned by the VMA in 2007, industry leaders developed a vision for creating a skills pipeline by: establishing statewide competency-based and employer-validated standards for critical occupations; developing a competency-based training program designed by employers; creating an advanced technology career pathway; and, identifying an expert training and development institution to deliver industry-driven training and assessment. VMA leaders announced that they achieved this goal in December, crediting ECPI University for its vital role in this important strategic initiative.

North Carolina

Charlotte – held three events in November and December to provide donations to Toys for Tots and the Charlotte Food Bank, as well as approximately 140 pounds of winter clothing for the Fort Peck Indian Reservation.

Charlotte/Concord - collected enough toys to help more than 1,800 families through Toys for Tots.

Greensboro - the Spanish Club held a book drive for the local children's hospital; the American Criminal Justice Association Club sponsored a Coats for Kids drive; Phi Beta Lambda spent an afternoon doing holiday crafts with residents at a nursing home; the Information Systems Security Association Club sponsored a family for the holidays; and the newly formed



Alumni Association conducted a food drive for the Greensboro Urban Ministry Food Bank. And, when thieves broke into a student's home taking all her children's presents, the campus rallied, collecting more than \$500 to replace everything!

Raleigh – students, staff, clubs and organizations adopted 36 ECPI children who were going to receive little or nothing under their tree this year. They also collected 32 grocery store gift cards and gave each family a delicious Thanksgiving and Christmas meal. They capped it all off by donating four large boxes of food to NC Food Relief.

South Carolina

Charleston – participated in the annual Debi's Kids Toy Drive to provide presents to children in need within Charleston's Tri-County area. Students and faculty collected enough toys to help more than 100 young people.

Virginia

Virginia Beach – healthcare administration students held a food drive for Senior Services of Southeastern Virginia, collecting emergency supplies as well. The school's Business Cents Club held two drives, one for the Foodbank of Southeastern Virginia and the other aimed at delivering toys to First Step, Inc., a local organization that helps victims of domestic violence. an Angel Tree to bring Christmas to children in need. Richmond/Innsbrook – faculty and staff sponsored nine student families as a part of its annual Angel Tree campaign. In addition to donations made by staff and faculty, each family received two large gift baskets that included every item on their wish list plus a \$100 food basket from Martin's Food Market.

Richmond/Moorefield – as part of the Toys for Tots campaign, the Web Club held a fundraising luncheon and used proceeds to purchase four bicycles and 68 other toys. Plus, the ECPI and Medical Careers Institute campuses pulled together to collect 520 pounds of food for the food bank.

Students Volunteer to Provide Dental Care to People in Need

or most people, going to the dentist is really not a choice. While they may not enjoy the experience, they know it's necessary. Unfortunately for some, it's just not an option. Lacking insurance, money, or both, they allow small problems to become big ones over time. Fortunately, there is a group of



caring people who come to the rescue. In Suffolk, Virginia this winter, dozens of dentists, hygienists and assistants, including many from ECPI's Medical Careers Institute, donated their time at Dental Access Days to help provide desperately needed care to those in need.

With limited time for each patient, treatment was confined to cleaning, fillings and extractions, with some patients receiving flippers, which are acrylic partial dentures used to replace a few missing teeth. Aside from pain relief and cosmetic value, these treatments did more than simply make people feel better. Many times, they show up in the emergency room with serious dental problems, but hospitals can do little more than give them antibiotics and painkillers.

Dental Access Days gave nearly 150 of those underserved patients a chance to improve their quality of life. Plus, this day of service reminded everyone involved that it's not just what you get, but what you give that makes all the difference.

Five years ago, Joshua Plata found himself sitting in a Greenville, South Carolina homeless shelter weighing his options. They seemed few and far between. "All I knew was that something had to change," says Joshua. "I had no skills and without an education, it seemed like I had nothing but low-paying jobs to look forward to."

Then, Joshua saw an ad for ECPI University. "I had always liked computers, but only knew how to use a PC," he says. In February 2007, he set out to change the course of his life and enrolled at ECPI to begin studying computer networking.

"I had no idea what I was getting into," says Joshua. "Right off the bat, I was amazed. It was like there was this whole world that I didn't know existed...all this knowledge. Up until then, I guess I just didn't know what I didn't know!"



Going to school and working full-time, Joshua received his Associate's degree in 2010, as well as his A+, Network+ and Cisco CCNA certifications. He quickly landed a job at internet service provider Windstream Communications. Interestingly enough, he says there was just one question during the interview that threw him off. "They asked me where I saw myself in five years. That was hard to answer, because five years before I was sitting in a homeless shelter and I never would have imagined that I could be where I am now."

Joshua's outlook has changed dramatically. He's back at ECPI working on his Bachelor's degree and has no doubt that he will finish up very soon because, as he puts it, "the only way you can fail at ECPI is if you stop trying. They believed in me before I was sure I believed in myself. Now I know I can do whatever I put my mind to."
