

The counselors maintain close relationships with local VA Vet Centers and VA medical facilities, referring Veterans as needed for counseling or medical services and providing assistance enrolling in and applying for VA benefits.

ECPI University's new VOSC counselor, Maureen Gibson, is already on the job and will be working out of the Virginia Beach Campus' new Vet Center. "We are very excited about having Maureen on board," says Bob Larned. "She's a wealth of information and will no doubt be a tremendous asset to our military and veteran students. Being selected to host a campus counselor also speaks volumes about the way the VA views ECPI University and its commitment to serving service members, past and present."

For many students, writing can be stressful. The thought of having to produce 8-10 pages on a topic they may or may not have previous knowledge on can be overwhelming. Entities such as the Writing Assistance Center, commonly known as the WAC, are in place to alleviate the anxieties students have regarding writing.



The WAC serves several purposes when it comes to student success. The most obvious is to tutor students in writing. 



HANDS-ON LEARNING



programming skills used in the current marketplace. They also learned how PLCs are used to interface with motors, motor drives, sensors, pneumatics, and hydraulics.







Culinary Institute of Virginia Begins Construction of Greenhouse

Soil-Less Environment to Create "Perfect" Atmosphere for Plants and Learning

t may be cold outside but in just a few short weeks ECPI University's College of Culinary Arts, Culinary Institute of Virginia, will have one spot on campus that will feel "just right" all year long. That's because construction is underway on the school's new greenhouse. Nearly 2000-square feet, it will soon yield a steady supply of fresh produce, including five types of lettuce, tomatoes, herbs, eggplant, and peppers.

While there are many universities with greenhouses, they are typically managed by agricultural departments. "It's unusual for culinary schools to manage their own hydroculture garden, but as hospitality educators, it is important to us that we expose our students to current trends in the industry, and this greenhouse certainly does that," says Food Service Management Program Director Layne Eggers.



locally-sourced food to reduce transit time, thereby reducing the use of fossil fuels and improving freshness. And when soil is eliminated, the benefits only increase.

That's right...no soil. The plants at the Culinary Institute of Virginia (CIV) will grow in nutrient-rich water. It's called hydroculture and it allows faculty and students to grow produce in a nearperfect environment. There are also no pesticides and no worries about too much or too little rain, or whether it's too hot or too cold. The result: plants grow much faster and much larger. Take lettuce, for instance. The average plant takes up to eight weeks to grow. In a hydroculture greenhouse, it can take as little as four weeks. Eggers expects to harvest about 10,000 heads per year. As for tomatoes, it's expected that those plants should produce about two and a half tons per year.

"The Hydroculture Garden and Learning Center will enhance the education of CIV students in so many ways," says Campus Provost Andy Gladstein. "Students will not just read about the benefits of sourcing local ingredients, they will get hands-on experience growing vegetables and herbs that will then be used in class. In any restaurant, the quality of ingredients used is as important as the chef preparing them, and we hope to instill this in our students by making the best possible produce available to them on a daily basis."

Among the many aspects of this comprehensive review, the SACSCOC Committees examine the University's mission and core values and their appropriateness to higher education and the development and rigor of ECPI University's academic programs, consistent with good academic practices. The review, however, is not limited to academics; SACSCOC reviews the entire organization, including academic and support services, facilities, library resources, policies, and practices.

As part of the reaffirmation process, ECPI developed a Quality Enhancement Plan, designed to impact student learning. This ongoing initiative, Students Find Information and Resources to Succeed Today or **Students FIRST**, intends to strengthen students' information literacy skills as it relates to their understanding of their chosen profession.

Starfish: A New Way for Students and Faculty to Stay in Touch

ECPI University recently acquired a new tool designed to help students communicate easier with faculty and staff; and to enable faculty and staff to communicate easier with students. The tool, "Starfish," uses technology that most are familiar with and applies it to helping with student-faculty interactions.

Through Starfish, students can make appointments online with faculty, staff, and administrators who have activated the online scheduling feature. Students are also able to view a personalized e-directory that lists resources they may need while in school, providing contact information, hours of operation, and overviews of the services provided. And students can use Starfish to adjust their communication channels from email to Facebook Messenger, or text – giving students greater control of where their communications come to. communications from faculty to their students. Most communications from faculty to students are positive messages related to course performance, often personalized to the student or to a specific accomplishment in the course. "Group" messages tend to be specifics related to the course - faculty are using Starfish to point students to a resource to add clarity to a concept covered in class, or to give students more information about upcoming assignments or to remind them about test content. Some messages sent by faculty are directed to students who are underperforming and are designed to help point them to University resources, including tutoring, study skills coaching, and advising opportunities that could help them improve their course performance.

Noteworthy Starfish statistics include:

- 3,443 ECPI students have created their "Starfish" profiles
- 498 appointments were scheduled with ECPI faculty/staff

13,645 messages were sent to ECPI students by faculty/staff

If you haven't yet visited Starfish, go to your Moodle page, click on "Go to Starfish." There is no new "url," username, or password to remember. Starfish is just simply a button within Moodle. Once you have successfully logged in, you will be greeted by name and provide a brief overview of the functionality. When seeing the system for the first time, most students are impressed with how intuitive and easy it is. Each campus has a Starfish Champion who can answer questions and assist users. Also, all faculty and staff have been trained on Starfish, so feel free to ask them for help!

ECPI University Now Offering Mechanical Engineering Technology Degree *New Program Developed in Response to Demand for Skilled Professionals*

CPI University is now offering a Bachelor of Science in Mechanical Engineering Technology at its Virginia Beach campus. Like every program offered at ECPI, it was developed in consultation with University employment partners, as well as the manufacturing industry as a whole.

"Forbes Magazine recently named Hampton Roads as the 7th ranked region in the United States for manufacturing growth," says ECPI University Virginia Beach Campus President Kevin Paveglio. "With the assistance of our curriculum advisory board – comprised of employers in the manufacturing sector – we have designed a program to meet the demand. This should be a win for everyone, including graduates who enter rewarding careers and the Commonwealth of Virginia which becomes more economically competitive."

Curriculum focuses on core areas such as:

- Mechanical design and analysis
- Material science and manufacturing processes

- Thermal-fluid-energy sciences
- Computer aided engineering graphics and analysis
- Electro-mechanical devices
- Instrumentation and controls

Upon completion, graduates can pursue employment in various public and private industries, including mechanical product design and fabrication, advanced manufacturing, power generation, plant management, and systems control.



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Virginia Board of Education Adds Manufacturing Certification to Approved Credential List *ECPI University to Provide Training at Participating High Schools*

The Virginia Board of Education has approved the Manufacturing Skills Institute's (MSI) Manufacturing Technician Level 1 (MT1) Certification for inclusion on the *Board of Education Approved Industry Certifications, Occupational Competency Assessments, and Licensure List.* Virginia's new High School Standard Diploma requires students to obtain an industry-recognized occupational credential in order to graduate.

As the exclusive training partner of the MSI and the Virginia Manufacturers Association (VMA), ECPI University will lead the instruction at participating schools. The MT1 Certification program was developed by the VMA to meet the growing employment demands and bridge the accelerating skills gap within Virginia's manufacturing sector.

The MT1 Certification will demonstrate to employers that an individual has an understanding of modern manufacturing and has mastered an array of technical skills, including:

- Math and Measurement
- Statistical Process Controls
- Spatial Reasoning
- Mechanics, Fluid Power, and Thermodynamics
- Electricity and Chemistry
- Manufacturing Processes and Controls
- Quality and Lean Manufacturing

Individuals obtaining the MT1 Certification may apply for advanced standing credit in selected degree programs at ECPI University to receive up to six (6) college credits. ECPI advanced standing credit may be used to establish transfer credits to other accredited two-year and four-year colleges and universities.

"ECPI University is excited to be a part of this effort to help drive the development and training of industry-certified workers within Virginia," says ECPI Virginia Beach Campus President Kevin Paveglio. "This academic initiative is going to lead to a 'real-world' outcome that will improve expansion for manufacturing. Providing employment-relevant education is what ECPI University has been doing for nearly half a century, so this is a natural fit for us."
